On the trail this year, we are building on the momentum of last year when the Ravenna folks added the railroad caboos and small flower garden with a bench nearby. New “train printed” curtains were made by treasurer, Diana Holovka, and are now installed in the caboose.

The Ravenna folks plan to install educational displays including railroad photos—historical information. Also, steps or a ramp is to be built for easier access. With our previously rebuilding of the 100-year old water tower, the railroad signs and signals that we’ve installed, plus the new additions, the Ravenna Trailhead is becoming the railroad historical focus of the Musketawa Trail, a tribute to our cooperative Ravenna partnership with Bruce Jones, David Ruble, and Harold Drake providing local leadership.

MEMORIAL BENCH:

The latest addition is a memorial bench installed just west of the Broadway Trail entrance by board members Ed Holovka, Oscar Reed, and Tim Nink. The bench is in memory of Paul Larsen and donated by wife Mary and children. Greg Sherburn, manager of the North Muskegon State Park, was helpful in site approval and bench acquisition.

A HUMBLE APPEAL: Please be careful as you bicycle our trail or elsewhere and wear a quality helmet, and urge others to do so as well. The State Police list 33 bicycle deaths in Michigan in 2015, a 57 percent increase. Our trails and bike lanes are the safest but still require vigilance. Bicycling has the highest rate of head injuries of any sport, exceeding football. This past summer, a 10-year old Pentwater youth was struck by a van, destroyed his bike and threw him head first on the pavement. His helmet, although cracked, saved his life.

MY END OF TENURE THANKS: Goes out to a lot of folks who were and are an integral part of a successful non-profit all volunteer organization including past and present board members who provided the time, skill, muscle, and guidance to get so much trail work and projects done. I should point out specifically, Joel Mikkelsen, current manager of the Hart-Montague Trail, who together we traveled to Lansing and St. Ignace to present before the Natural Resources Trust Fund Commission to obtain the initial funding. Joel, for years, was a project foreman and the hardest worker for all early large trail projects, i.e. trestles, etc. And, we've had a "hard core" of members, nearly 100 strong at this time whose memberships and donations have provided us with the financial means for trail work, enhancement projects, maintenance, and promotion. I appreciated the kind feedback and communication you've provided with my newsletters and personal Thank You cards. The Ravenna Village staff were most helpful from the start, especially our ex officio board member and past village president, Harold Drake (a trail visionary), Steve Anderson, maintenance supervisor and his staff, and office personnel including Sandy, DeeDee, and Teresa. Please excuse this partial listing, as many others have lent a helping hand.

MY PARTING NOTE: Approaching 85 years and rehabbing from open heart surgery, beginning January 1, 2017, it's time to pass the gavel to new president Tim Nink. Reflecting over the past, I feel that I made past contributions to family, community, country, and to human-kind. I've provided well for wife Diana, son Michael, daughter Terry, and four grandchildren. My trail work, oversite board (Foster care Review Board) chairing for abused and neglected children, 51 years of helping troubled individuals as a licensed psychologist, plus many projects for handicapped kids, has contributed to community. Ten years of U. S. Army/Active Army Reserve service during and after the Korean War was my contribution to country reaching the rank of M/Sgt (E-7). I served human-kind with mission trips to Haiti, Mexico, Louisiana, Ukraine, with six months of teaching in Slovakia, my mother's home country. I guess I also served myself well by obtaining four university degrees with a PhD, thanks in part to the G.I. Bill.

Isn't this great country when a kid raised in the shadows of the coal mines, one of nine children of immigrant parents with father a coalminer can achieve these goals—motivation for other kids to work, learn, and learn to become a team player.

STATE NEWS: The recent Michigan Trails & Greenways Coalition (MTGA) reports great news regarding the expansion of connection trails, including the Great Lake—to Lake Trail from Port Huron to South Haven by 2018. A host of other connections will be coming on line by that date.

Also noted, is the 26th Annual Michigander bicycle tour through "the most beautiful place in America". The tour dated July 15 – 22nd will run from Traverse City, Leland, Frankfort, shores of Lake Michigan, wine country, and the Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore.
