The Friends have also added railroad memorabilia along the way with railroad crossing signs, and a restored water tower and railroad caboose at the Ravenna Staging Area.

When you reach the end of the trail in Muskegon, look for the directional signs that guide you north along a connecting route on Latimer Drive to the Laketon Trail and Muskegon Lakeshore Trail.

The entire trail, from the Marne trailhead to Muskegon, is open to snowmobiling and cross-country skiing during the winter season.

Fred Meijer Pioneer Trail

The Fred Meijer Pioneer Trail begins where the Musketawa Trail ends, at the Marne trailhead, and will eventually continue on to Comstock Park where it will converge with the Fred Meijer White Pine Trail. The trail is paved with asphalt, passing through a scenic landscape of farms, woodlands and urban neighborhoods, including a tunnel under Fruit Ridge Avenue. The dream of one continuous trail connecting Grand Rapids to Muskegon is inching closer to reality. In 2012, the first 6 miles were completed from Marne to Walker Avenue. In 2015, the trail was extended 2 miles along Three Mile Road from Walker Avenue to Alpine Avenue. And in 2019, another mile was added from Alpine Avenue to West River Drive. Working with the Road Commission, Kent County Parks plans to build a new paved pathway along West River Drive within the next couple of years to make the final connection in Comstock Park.
